Social Enterprise Day—December 2016

In December we held our first Academy Day—at that time Key Stage 3 pupils were all based at our Romford Annexe. These pupils worked with the local Salvation Army with their clients, and gained a good insight into the care and charity industry.

Key Stage 4 pupils were involved in a CAFOD Fair Trade Day, looking at how to generate a promotion, sales and import business opportunity that also "gave back" to communities in challenging circumstances.

A Day in the Life...

"My day starts at 7.30am when I arrive at the Academy.

My first tasks of the day include:

- Arranging cover for colleagues at meetings or involved in off-site activities.
- Checking the school diary for special events.
- Plan my own lessons and resources for the day.

At 8.30 I lead our daily staff Briefing, highlighting events for the day, and discussing any pupil or curriculum issues to be aware of.

At 8.45 I take up my usual place at the Main Entrance, meeting and greeting pupils as they arrive to the academy. This is a great opportunity for me to pick up on any issues that they may have, so that they are ready for learning as quickly as possible.

Apart from my own teaching, (PSHE and Humanities,) most of my day is spent walking around the whole academy to check that pupils are in lessons and engaged with their learning. I supervise Break and Lunchtimes, making sure that staff are on their duty points, supporting the smooth running of activities, and ensuring that pupils return to lessons promptly.

At the end of the academy day for pupils I wave a cheery goodbye to our pupils, then lead Debriefing session with staff to review the day's highlights and points to address

Following Debriefing I often chair a staff meeting, either relating to personal development, welfare and behaviour, or meet with agencies outside of the academy.

I have at least one late meeting a week, discussing plans and progress with Leadership colleagues.

Having completed all of my paperwork, planned lessons and updated my resources, I usually lock up the academy at around 6pm.

You can come here and let yourself go." Deen also got involved in the session and added: "It's very good to get away from school for a little bit." Amal was buggey to watch his classmates on this occasion, but said: "Boxing is a good way of getting rid of aggression."

The building could certainly do with a bit of a maleover, but Lynes

spoke enthusiastically about a new era, adding: "Hornchurch & Elm Park Boxing Club has always been very community focused. You don't have to be a boxer to come down and Teacher Lisa Wilson was also grainful for the help given by Lynes, adding. "It's so important to work with professionals and Colin relates so well with the boys, talking to them about masking the most of life.

"He is very good at talking to the pupils and mentoring them, And Gary, our taxi, driver from Hornchurch Mini Cabs, is also wary good and patient with the pupils."

It was only a short 45-minute visit, but hearthoring to see the work being done by Lynes, who is hoping to help the club return to some of its former glories.
